

Abbreviated minutes No 771of ordinary meeting held on 7th March 2024 at LVH

Present: Cllrs Andrews (chair), Southcott (vice chair), McSmythurs, Mincher, Metherell, Wilkinson, Yeo, Cllr Mott - (WDBC), P van Delft (clerk)

- 1. The chair welcomed all those present and promptly invited Cllr Mincher to make a statement; Cllr Mincher informed that he had for a limited period a thermal camera to help with the identification of energy heat loss from buildings, some readings have already been made identifying where heat loss is taking place. Energy savings can be made. Cllr Alexander will continue to take readings in the short term when requested. Results from the readings to be available at the next meeting.
- 2. Apologies for absence Cllrs Alexander and Perkins
- 3. Members of the public open forum 5 parishioners present A request from a parishioner asking for action to make restricted parking on Stoney Lane in the vicinity of her property because medical services were not able to gain vehicle access to her neighbours' property. The police were asked to intervene so that the medical services could carry out their duties. The parishioner stated that if the Fire brigade were involved then parked vehicles in that area would seriously hinder their assistance. Cllrs Andrews, Southcott, Mincher and McSmythurs would look into the matter.

A parishioner raised issues relating to planning app. 0255/24/ARM including water related issues, a possible contamination issue, security, lighting, noise abatement and phase two of the development site made no mention of waste water removal measures. The chair thanked the parishioner and would consider those issues when determining the application.

- A parishioner thanked the council for the prompt response to his correspondence relating to the pot-holes in Stoney Lane.
- 4. Declarations of Interest Cllr Yeo relating to planning application 0065/24/FUL
- 5. Minutes of previous meeting 770 being a true reflection of that meeting was approved and signed by the chair. Proposed Cllr Southcott, seconded Cllr McSmythurs, motion carried.
- 6. Planning app. Ref:- 0065/24/FUL Demolition of existing dwelling & 1 x proposed new build dwelling to be constructed on same site including driveway and garage, including refurbishment of corrugated metal shed, gardens and orchard area (resubmission of 2013/23/FUL) Wheatley Cottage, Lewdown, EX20 4QW Council decision Support Proposed Cllr Metherell, seconded Cllr Mincher, motion carried. Cllr Yeo asked to be excused from the decision process for this application. Planning app. Ref:- 0255/24/ARM Application for revised matters submission in respect of appearance, landscaping, layout & scale following outline consent 1666/20/OPA for the erection of 30 dwellings. Jethros Coach House, Lewdown, EX20 4DS. Council decision Object Proposed Cllr McSmythurs, seconded Cllr Mincher, motion carried Cllr Southcott abstained
- 7. Finance Payments were authorised for the following; Lewdown Cricket Club Donation £215, Community Newslink Donation £200.00, Peter van Delft admin sundries £64.83, Mat Electrics Air Ambulance lights service £137.45, Vison ICT Annual website support £ 161.26. Proposed Cllr Southcott, seconded Cllr McSmythurs, motion carried.
- 8. Outcome from meeting with South West Water at the Lewdown treatment works. Cllr Andrews reported that several council members attended the site meeting that

was hosted by SWW representatives. It was reported that outflow data was not yet available for 2023, councillors were shown the existing reed beds that could be used for the filtration of water prior to final discharge. Concern was raised from councillors about storm tank storage but SWW informed that the existing capacity was sufficient. S.W.W did not address the questions that were raised by the council prior to the meeting, the clerk was asked to seek a response for those questions. Cllr Yeo thanked S.WW. for the site visit.

- 9. Cross-roads development No update for outstanding issues are available.
- 10.Defibrillator Repair/renew Cllrs Mincher and Southcott provided grant information that could help with the purchase of a replacement. The clerk to enquire further. Date, place and time of next meeting Monday 25th March, Lewdown Victory Hall, 7.30pm

The chair thanked those attending for all their comments and said that those concerns would be considered when determining the application.

- 6. Housing survey WDBC response. Cllr McSmythurs asked for the item to be held over to the next meeting.
- 7. Planning app. Ref:- 0439/24/HHO Householder application for proposed extension to existing property. The Bungalow, Road from Huddispitt Cross to Cross Roads, EX20 4DR Council decision Support proposed Cllr McSmythurs, seconded Cllr Metherell, motion carried.
 - Planning app. Ref:- 0704/24/FUL Erection of an agricultural storage building and formation of an agricultural access track (retrospective). Higher Widdacombe Farm, Lewdown, EX20 4EA Council decision support proposed Cllr McSmythurs, seconded Cllr Metherell, motion carried.
 - Planning app. Ref:- 4164/23/OPA Proposed development of 13 No light industrial units with new access road, parking and external works. Land at SX458 868, Lewdown.- Council decision Object proposed Cllr Mincher, seconded Cllr McSmythurs, motion carried.
 - Planning app. Ref:- 0820/24/FUL Application to extend the garden of Thrushel View, Thrushel View, Lewdown, EX20 4QP- Council decision proposed Cllr McSmythurs, seconded Cllr Mincher, motion carried.
- 8. Finance
 - 8.1 Payments were authorised for the following; Cllr Southcott Refund for VAS

equipment parts £180.92, Peter van Delft - Salary (Feb- March) £527.25, HMRC - Clerk paye £90.60. Proposed Cllr Alexander, seconded Cllr Mincher, motion carried, Cllr Southcott did not vote.

- 8.2 Caroline Harris The contract with the Annual payroll provider was renewed, proposed Cllr Yeo, seconded Cllr McSmythurs, motion carried.
- 8.3 R.F.O. reported a credit balance after payments £19,883.95 proposed Cllr Alexander, seconded Cllr McSmythurs, motion carried
- 9. New Councillors vacant seats for Coryton and Marystow, no new councillors.
- 10.Cllr Reports Cllr Alexander reported that the highway from Lewtrenchard to Bratton Clovelly has many pot holes and much of the highway is in poor condition. Cllr Yeo reported that the resurfacing work at Sourton Cross was a great improvement.
- 11.Play area update Cllr McSmythurs reported that he held a conversation with a planning officer, subject to the actual planning application it was thought that WDBC was supportive of a proposal. Cllr Perkins obtained 3 quotations, Dragon Play, Caledonia Play and Sovereign. Caledonia Play is a local company and has supplied equipment at the Lydford play area. After considered deliberation Cllr Mincher proposed to use Caledonia Play, seconded Cllr Metherell motion carried. Cllrs Perkins and McSmythurs can now proceed further with the draft planning application. The clerk reminded councillors of the time limitation for Section 106 money to use for the scheme.
- 12.Energy efficiency Cllrs Mincher and Alexander undertook several house surveys unfortunately the warm weather conditions made the exercise a little more challenging than had it been cooler, from the readings taken at some properties some simple heat-saving measures could be taken so significant savings can be made.
- 13.Correspondence Lamerton P.C. Questionnaire The chair reported that he conversed with LPC and informed that LGPC did not have a Neighbourhood plan. Website security a Parishioner informed that the website had a contradiction regarding security, the clerk would look into the matter. Message of appreciation for donations received from the Lewdown Residents Association. A card and messages of appreciation was received from a parishioner for the work done by the councillors for the temporary signs erected to help keep clear a small section of Stoney Lane. Cllr McSmythurs reported that he held a conversation with the parishioner regarding the parking problem in Stoney Lane, the advice he received was for the parishioner to contact the local police directly who will look into the matter further. Correspondence was received from a concerned parishioner regarding the council statement on its website, the clerk will action the change required.
- 14.Defibrillator replacement update The clerk to be provided details of the equipment that is required so that a quotation and possible grants can be obtained.
 9.20pm The meeting went into Part 2 members of the public were asked to exit the meeting proposed Cllr McSmythurs seconded Cllr Alexander, motion carried.
- 15.Clerk employment contract update It was resolved to support the amended contract that reflects the clerks current duties. Proposed Cllr McSmythurs, seconded Cllr Alexander, motion carried.

Lewtrenchard WI April Report

We met on April 08 at Lewdown Victory Hall. Margaret welcomed 19 members Mary (a potential new member), Naomi and our speaker Genevieve. Jerusalem was sung.

Our speaker Genevieve from the Hog Hospital: a trained veterinary nurse, the vet's Genevieve worked for received many ill and injured hedgehogs, as no one had much time she took them under her wing, this spiralled out of control



and grew into a hedgehog hospital at her home in Cheriton Bishop. Our hedgehogs are the European type, they come in lots of colours: silver, brown, blond. They have a 6-year lifespan and can weigh up to 1kg. Their closest relatives are moles and shrews, they are unique having no fight or flight instinct, have been around for more than 15 million years, current UK count is ~250,000. They can travel 5 miles in a night, a map of hedgehogs fitted with trackers was

shown demonstrating what they get up to which was very interesting and entertaining. Contrary to belief slugs & snails and milk & bread are bad for hedgehogs, they cannot digest fruit or vegetables. Instead feed them cat or hedgehog food. Their main predators are badgers and humans. How do you spot a troubled hedgehog? If they are out in the daylight, shaped into an odd ball, not protecting their faces with their spikes, then something is wrong, 'The ball says it all'. Wear gloves when picking them up, put them in a towel lined box, take them to a vet or a Hog Hospital. To encourage hedgehogs into your garden, make an insect Hotel near a compost bin, make sure you check before forking it over, create hedgehog tunnels, piles

of bonfire wood are great for hibernating but check for habitation before lighting. For more info see: https://bighedgehogmap.org. Genevieve nurses about 200 hedgehogs a year with

an amazing 80% success rate. The Hog Hospital self-funds, it receives many food donations from members of the public. Spread the word: one saved hedgehog could multiply by 400 a year. Helping them to survive helps us with climate change. Genevieve is clearly very passionate about these cute animals; her talk was interesting, informative and inspiring.





From the Mountains of Japan

No.2 - Japan's Terrifying New Year's Eve Visitor

Japan is a land rich in local traditions and folklore, and one of the most interesting comes from the remote Oga Peninsula, which juts out of northern Akita Prefecture into the Japan Sea.

Oga is the home of the Namahage ("Na-ma-ha-geh"), a mountain deity demonic in appearance with straw-covered bodies, which visit every household on the peninsula on New Year's Eve to meet with the head of each family, consult them on the year's harvest and chastise them for any laziness within the family.

The tradition is fairly ritualistic. On New Year's Eve, two or three local men, dressed in horrifying masks and wearing straw clothing, with come crashing

into a house, slamming doors, shouting and hollering. The head of the household will then offer them a preprepared meal, and a glass of local sake ("sa-keh" – Japanese rice wine), while the Namahage ask about the year's harvest, then begin questioning about any supposedly lazy members of the family.

At this point the Namahage will put on a show of anger, threatening to carry away any lazy children to the mountains (TV news reports of the yearly even show children literally screaming in terror as the Namahage make a show of stealing them away from their parents or putting them into rice sacks (not unlike the Krampus legends of Germany), before they are placated with more sake and Japanese rice cake.



According to the guide at the informative Namahage Cultural Museum, the word "Namahage" originates from a Japanese expression that mean "warming one's feet by the fire", and indeed, one of the items a Namahage carries is a knife for cutting the fire-warmed skin off of lazy people.

The tradition dates back to the Edo Period (1603-1868), and as a public school teacher of many lazy kids, is one I would be happy to see "enjoyed" more widely!







Steam

I started my career on the Railway at Guildford Steam Shed 70c, it had ten classes of engine U, N, Q, Q1, S15 Class 3, 4 & 5 standards and standard tank Class 4 & 3 plus the Shed Pilot called Little Jim a USA Tank.

The shed was a half roundhouse which was used for repairs, cleaning, washout, etc. The running shed had seven roads of which No. 2 was for engines that could not fit on the turntable - they drove straight over. As cleaners, we cleaned engines, helped the fitters, boiler washers, boiler smiths, unloaded the store wagon and assisted the storeman. If a duty was changed, we had



to take a call note of change of duty to the drivers and firemen. Also if there was a derailment then the steam crane would be made ready and we rushed out and called the fitters in. All shed staff were encouraged to further their knowledge, so a driver might ask you if were interested in going with him and ride light engine to Woking and back.

I remember 1963 being very cold, the shed pilot would bring a wagon of coke on No. 7 road, we would unload, then go round riddling the braziers and topping up, to stop the engines from freezing.

In 1964 I passed out from firing school and was put into the old mans gang. No nights, earliest turn 6am, latest 2pm. My driver was Frank Cox who was aged 64. Drivers over 60 could finish their career in this gang.

Next was a move to the running links, the driver was John Carter and he let me drive every other day. I was 17 years old. This was providing I got the engine ready, oiled up, etc. Unfortunately, he was a part time running foreman so when he was required to do this duty, I was sent on loan to Nine Elms, Felpham or Basingstoke.



I had a week on the table gang at Nine Elms preparing and disposing of engines and placing them in the running shed. Towards the end of the week the foreman asked me to get the 5.30 Bournemouth engine ready, a merchant navy class, I said I would be prepared to go, I was only 17 - let me on that big engine!

I met the driver and he told me to fill the firebox up until it was rolling out of the door then went under the hopper for the best coal and off to Waterloo, back onto the train 12 coaches, put the correct headcode on, plus

electric lights. 5.30pm and we have the right away. 40mph to Clapham, then 60mph to New Malden, then double regulator and she flew, as we approached Surbiton steam was falling, luckily we had to go on the main local at Hampton Court junction, 60mph, my driver turned to look at my fire and said I was firing like a U class, he said two shovels each corner and two in the door and repeat, nothing in the down front - it will shake down there. We turned back onto the main line at Weybridge, next stop Southampton.

It is something quite wonderful when an engine is working flat out and, when steaming freely, the exhaust sucks the fire and you are continually shovelling.

Relief at Southampton and then back to Clapham with a van train standard 5. When we arrived at Clapham I thought I had a night out because my last train had left Waterloo, unbeknown to me control had stopped the train at Clapham to pick me up because I was 17 and not allowed to work nights.





Gardening Jobs For May

Don't rush

There is still plenty of time during May to sow lots of 'summer' vegetables, like runner beans, french beans and courgettes, regardless of what the seed packets might say.

These warmth loving plants don't take long to get going, and there is still plenty of time to sow them now, before planting out in June.



Keep on top of weeds


Whilst the warmer weather is great for our plants, it's also great for weeds.. which can so easily get out of control if you don't stay on top of them.

Whilst hoeing is a good option for dealing with small annual weeds (and where there is room between plants), for larger or perennial weeds such as couch grass you'll need to weed them by hand – I find a small knife does the job.

Sow parsnips (and radish)

As the soil warms up, it's a great time to sow your parsnips, and I like to sow radish in between the rows (see below diagram) for two good reasons:

- 1. The radish act as a sort of 'sacrificial' crop which will hopefully draw slugs away from your precious parsnip seedlings
- 2. Parsnips take a long time to germinate (often 3 to 4 weeks) and so the quick to emerge radish help mark out the rows, and then utilise the space between the parsnip rows which would otherwise be wasted






