

These minutes are provisional until they are signed by the chair at the next meeting of the parish council.

Meeting No 726

Present: Cllrs Leroy St Louis (Chair), Alexander, Lorna St Louis, Cllr Edmonds (WDBC), Peter van Delft (clerk), Apologies: Cllrs Govett and Law

- 1. Dispensations & declarations of interest none declared.
- 2. Minutes of previous meeting 725 were signed as a true and accurate record of that meeting, proposed Cllr Lorna St Louis, seconded Cllr Alexander, all in favour
- 3. Finance 3.1 Payments approved Peter van Delft clerk salary (May June) £330.85, HMRC PAYE for clerk £12.40, Lewdown Grouped Parish Council projector hire £10.00, Proposed Cllr Alexander, seconded Cllr Lorna St Louis, all in favour. 3.2 R.F.O. reported a credit balance of £4,772.87 after approved payments, proposed Cllr Leroy St Louis, seconded Cllr Alexander, all in favour. 3.3 Bank signatory update- removal and additions. It was resolved to include Cllr Law and remove previous Cllrs, proposed Cllr Alexander, seconded Cllr Lorna St Louis, all in favour. 3.4 Financial regulation policy Approval of updated N.A.L.C. version. It was resolved to adopt the policy, motion proposed by Cllr Lorna St Louis, seconded Cllr Alexander, all in favour. 3.5 Anti-Fraud & Corruption Policy The R.F.O. requested that this policy is held over to the next meeting. AGAR. Notification of exempt status logged by external auditor. The R.F.O. reported that the external auditor acknowledged receipt of the documents with no further action due.
- 4. Cllr Edmonds of WDBC reported that the draft accounts had shown a small credit surplus had been achieved despite the challenges it faced in the current circumstances, the accounts would now go to the external auditor. The council had been busy with the recent General election. The various committee's would next meet on 23rd July to resume work.
- 5. Reports from Councillors Cllr Leroy St Louis reported that he had received a dog fouling complaint from a parishioner, the Cllr advised that the complaint could be registered and dealt with through the W.D.B.C. website. Cllr Edmonds suggested that WDBC could manage the complaint through its dog warden and reminded the council that signage was available from WDBC and that dog warden patrols could be actioned.
- 6. Parish Councillors vacancies The chair reminded councillors that two vacancies remained.
- 7. Table Tennis Council initiative to help with health & fitness. It was resolved to hold this item over to the next meeting when full council is present.
- 8. Correspondence The clerk informed that two letters were received in connection to planning application 1311/24/FUL, both letters provided detailed reasons for objection to the proposal.
- 9. Members of the public open forum One member present who wished to comment on planning application 1311/24/FUL, the parishioner gave detailed reasons for objecting to the proposal mainly citing privacy issues, drainage management and the business viability of the proposal when considering existing similar established businesses are present in the local vicinity. The parishioner also enquired what could be done to reduce the speed of vehicles through Portgate. The chair informed that after many years of communication with Devon Highways it proved difficult to introduce a reduction in the speed of vehicles on a that stretch of road that has a speed limit of 60mph. Recipe for Cooking with Children: Berry Sundaes with Chocolate Sauce

An indulgent treat. It's fun, if messy, to assemble a bowl of berries, whipped cream and nuts, pots of ice-cream and a jug of sauce, and let everyone put together their own pud. Serves six.

Ingredients: 200g strawberries 200g raspberries 3 tbsp caster sugar

For the sauce: 150ml double cream 2 tbsp Golden Syrup

200g dark chocolate, broken in pieces

To serve: Vanilla, strawberry or chocolate ice-cream

100ml double cream, lightly whipped

1 small handful toasted almonds, chopped (optional)

Method:

Halve large strawberries lengthways and leave small ones whole. Mix in a bowl with the raspberries and sugar, and macerate for 30 minutes.

Meanwhile, make the sauce. Put the chocolate, cream and syrup in a heatproof bowl, place over a pan of barely simmering water (the water shouldn't touch the base of the bowl) and stir gently from time to time, until everything is melted into a smooth, rich sauce. Keep warm over the pan until you're ready to use it.

Layer berries, ice-cream and cream in sundae glasses, and finish with a trickle of sauce. Add a sprinkling of nuts, if you like.



Gardening Jobs For September

Time is flying by and we are now into September, another summer has almost passed and as seems to be the case more often than not, the weather was rather unpredictable. While the conventional growing season is coming to an end, there are still plenty of things to keep you busy in the garden this September.

Save 'seeds'

Saving your own seeds (and bulbs) can have a number of benefits, from reducing the cost of next year's crop, to providing you with seeds you know are fresh (sometimes bought seeds can be older, and less successful than you'd hope).

For an easy starter, I have kept back a few of my garlic bulbs (harvested in late June), to plant cloves back in the ground in October/November, ready for next years harvest. The same can be said for shallots, simply hold onto some of this year's harvest (dug up and dried out in July), and then these can be re-planted in spring to provided next summer's crop.



French and runner beans are both easy to save seeds from, simply leave some pods on the plants until they start to dry out and go crispy. You can then shell the beans from the pods and place on a bright window sill for a week or so until fully dry. These can be stored in jars or paper envelopes ready for next year (just don't forget to label them!).

Preserve

If, like me, you've started to have enough of eating runner beans with every meal of the week, why not preserve some to enjoy in winter or even spring?

For an easy way of preserving vegetables, there are plenty of crops which can be easily frozen, including french and runner beans, carrots and chillies. This year I had a few onions which wouldn't have stored well due to damaged skin, I used what I could in the kitchen, but the excess onions were chopped up and frozen. Fresh is best, but now I have ready to go diced onions for those evenings where I don't have time (or can't be bothered) to chop an onion for dinner.



Spare tomatoes can also be frozen whole or chopped, just place them in a freezer bag in good sized portions, and then these can be easily taken out and used to create bases for a variety of sauces as and when you need them.

There are plenty of vegetables that can be pickled (garlic, beetroot, gherkins) or turned into chutney (runner beans, marrows, onions, green tomatoes), and these can be great ways of using up surplus harvests and preserving the taste of summer that bit longer.

Dear friends,

Although I could in no way be described as sporty, and I do not have the physique of an athlete! I do appreciate the endeavours of those who train hard to achieve greatness in physical endeavours. From my lovely comfy chair, I have partaken in the thrills and excitement of the Olympic games in Paris.

There was some excellent competition, and some wonderful surprises for some with gut wrenching disappointment for others, and yet what pleased me beyond words was the wonderful display of sportsmanship, comradery, and collaboration between athletes who despite being opponents in the pool or ring, or on the track or pitch, were able to celebrate with, and support, each other in their victory or loss, showing empathy and compassion to their fellow competitors.

How sad it was then, to have as the other major news item the horrific violence that has recently affected our nation. The death of those three little girls in Southport was a horrendous action, and I am sure that the Justice system will deal with it accordingly. However, the deliberate manipulation of misinformation by some, and the vicious hatred that it unlocked in others, was a total disgrace. Communities, which already feel

exceedingly vulnerable, were targeted, as were those whose duty it is to protect all of us and keep order.

I am delighted that so many communities rallied round to protect those who were being targeted. Many churches and church leaders took their place in demonstrating what community life should be,and witnessed to the reconciling love of Christ in practical ways.

The saddest thing is that people will use Christianity, or a distorted version of it, as an excuse for showing hatred to those who are different. Real Christianity is hospitable and compassionate. Jesus demonstrated this in his own words and actions. Let us pray that we demonstrate real Christianity in our language and behaviour and call out False teaching when we hear it, and unglodly action when we see it.

They often walk many miles in the worst possible conditions, often taking much, much longer walking back with a casualty on a stretcher, but they will always follow up a call for help no matter the weather. If you are in trouble, call 999 and ask for the police then Mountain Rescue. Matts advice: Always tell someone where you are going, which route you plan to take and what time you plan to be back. If the person doesn't come back as planned, make that 999 call. We raised a fantastic sum of more than £500 for NDS&R - well done all.

Matt kept his talk brief so as not to bore people, but everyone was fascinated and interested, so much so that Matt answered about 15 questions from the floor. I have recently received a letter from Openreach regarding the **Gigabit Broadband Voucher Scheme**. Although initially sceptical (what's this gonna cost me?) I did some further research thru their website and also at <u>gov.uk</u>, and found these projects are countrywide, and aimed at getting ultra fast full fibre broadband into rural areas such as ours. The government has dedicated £5 billion towards this, and all that is required for us is to pledge our voucher into the scheme, which will then apply towards the cost of providing it, and agree to sign up to ultrafast full fibre when it's available within 2 months. The cost of that appears to be similar to what we are currently paying, but the speeds are so much better!

I'm not one who absolutely needs fast upload and download speeds, but there are those in the community, families and businesses, who do, and will benefit hugely.





Along with his friend, Robert Burnard, SBG organised the first scientific archaeological excavations of hut circles on Dartmoor at Grimspound during 1893. Others soon joined them and the Dartmoor Excavation Committee was formed. Their work was not without criticism, but their work in identifying an re-erecting significant stones contributed to their protection from anyone who might fancy a block of granite.

Our speaker has spent 25 years with the Dartmoor National Park Association, the last five years as Senior Archaeologist so this should be an extremely interesting talk about SBG's archaeological work on Dartmoor and elsewhere in Devon.

From the Mountains of Japan

No.6 - Hachiko: Japan's Most Famous Dog

In Tokyo, at the famous and stunningly busy Shibuya station road crossing, there is a bronze statue of a dog with one bent ear. This is Hachiko, Japan's most famous dog, who lived from 1923 to 1935, and the star of the Richard Gere-starring movie of a similar name, Hachi: A Dog's Tale, released in 2009, a movie you should never watch without a box of tissues. Spoiler: they both die, but for one it's far less traumatic than the other.

An Akita dog, a breed originally developed for hunting and fighting, Hachiko was the pet of Hidesaburo Ueno, a university professor who worked in Tokyo. Hachiko would accompany him to the station in the morning, then return to the station each evening to greet his master as he returned home. However, in 1925, when Hachiko was only 18 months old, Ueno died of a cerebral hemorrhage while at work. The dog obviously didn't know this, so for the next ten years, until his own death, he would show up at the station each day, waiting in vain for his master to return.

An example of loyalty in Japanese culture, Hachiko, and the subsequent statue at Shibuya station became famous, as well as reviving the Akita breed, which at the time of Hachiko's death had declined to just thirty purebred dogs.

However, it was in the far north of Japan, in Akita Prefecture, where Hachiko was born, and in March this year, my daughter and I undertook a pilgrimage to the dog's home town. Far less famous than Shibuya, we visited the small town of Odate, home of an Akita dog museum – where we found the Richard Gere movie playing on a loop – and a disappointing visitor centre where you could watch – but not touch – an Akita dog playing with a ball through a glass screen, before buying some expensive Made-in-China souvenirs to take home.

Finally finding some element of poignancy, we stopped at the dog's actual birthplace on the way home, where we found another statue outside a nondescript family home. The only two people there, we paid tribute at the statue, then used the dog-shaped toilet block next to the small car park, a somewhat jarring but rather unique monument to this most loyal of dogs.



Michaelmas & October SBG100 Events

We have a full list of autumn events to celebrate the polymath who died 100years ago. Sabine Baring-Gould was "Squarson" at Lewtrenchard (parson and squire) for over 40years. He was one of the most famous novelists of his time, writing over 1000 publications on the West Country, travel, archaeology, religion, the supernatural and collected 100's of local folk songs and tunes. An "Uncle Tom Cobbley and all" list!

This is the traditional time for country fairs and festivals as quoted in "Red Spider" a story based on Bratton Clovelly folk. Michaelmas was the time for rehiring farm labourers and house- or milk-maids plus it was the time of round-up on Dartmoor when animals would be appraised and those thought fit for market or surplus to the farm or even unfit for another winter on the moor sold at the annual sales eg Widecombe, Sticklepath, Tavistock Goosey and Sourton Fairs. These fairs were sung about and the songs – Widdicombe Fair (Uncle Tom Cobbley and all) and Strawberry Fair (a top 10 hit in the 1960's) are examples of two old folk songs collected in west Devon.





Reflections on our Service

In September, Citizens Advice will be celebrating 85 years of providing free, confidential, non-judgmental advice to anyone who needs it regardless of personal circumstances.

The nature of advice people has sought has moved with the times through World War 2, post war changes, the 'swinging' sixties, and the changing social and economic changes throughout each decade thereafter. Sometimes geography played a big part in the nature of problems that people have asked for help with. For example, during times of industrial unrest there have been marked contrasts to the problems experienced by people in urban, industrial areas compared to people in rural and farming communities.

More recently, the gap between these areas has closed. The cost of living crisis is impacting on people countrywide and people and families across the country are sharing the challenges of coping with rising energy costs and spiralling bills in general.

At this time of year families are also having to deal with issues brought about as children go back to school or change schools altogether. Trying to fund the cost of new school uniforms on top of meeting day to day living expenses puts an additional strain on family budgets that are already stretched.

Family holidays can no longer be taken for granted and keeping children active and engaged throughout the summer break is challenging on many levels. It can also cost money.

One of the first things that we do at CA TNMWD is run a benefits check to see if additional funding is available and if so, advise on how best to go about claiming it and, if needed, helping with that claim.

Schools, by and large, are far better in touch now and many have excellent arrangements in place selling second hand uniforms. Recognising that just about everyone is feeling the pinch one way or another, increasingly people are reaching out for whatever help they can get – hopefully without shame or embarrassment.

Here at CA TNMWD, we listen to people's problems – often a big step helping people to move forward. Sometimes people can find their own way forward having accessed information on our website: www.citizensadvicetnmwd.org.uk, but we also recognise the fact that people very often need the reassurance of personal help, reassurance and guidance whether that be via our AdviceLine **0808 2787 999** or via a face to face meeting.

It is probable that next month will see the focus on energy costs in the wake of the removal of the winter fuel allowance for pensioners and the anticipated increase in fuel costs this winter.

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
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
