

Reflections of a Steam Fireman

Being in the old mans gang meant not always working locally, if we were available we would be allocated a turn. One such turn was a freight from Basingstoke to Felpham, a full load with an S15 class via Chertsey & Staines, I liked these engines, they steam well with plenty of power. On arrival at Felpham goods yard I uncoupled the engine and went to the loco to clean the fire etc and we were home passenger to our loco.



Felpham yard was a hump yard where our train would be pushed up the hump very slowly by the shunt loco a 350 diesel, and the shunters would uncouple wagons the signalman would set the road for the wagons destination and shunters would slow the wagons with their shunting stick on the brakes sometimes riding it (I suspect illegally).

If, at the steam shed, the bike was leaning against the wall, you could take the bike and leave it at the station, because it was some distance you would be allowed 30 minutes so you would ride the bike with the driver on the crossbar.

With Frank we had a special with a Standard 2-6-0 5mt to Liss and the Longmoor military sidings to pick up 60 empty coal wagons, when we arrived the shunter lets us into LMR and explained the plan, we pull forward and reversed onto our train and I couple up, the guard told my driver the load and explained it was going to be a difficult shunt, hedge restricting vision length of train etc my driver said when given the signal he would reverse steady.

I walk back half the length of the train until I could see the guard who had the shunter in sight he waved his flag I signal Frank it was ok to set back I rejoined the engine just as there was a bang and we came to a halt. I run towards the end of the train to see the guards van on top of the solid stop block.

The young shunter said that the signalman at Liss station crossing ordered him to close the points so he could let traffic through which was giving him verbal for the delay - completely against the rules.


Train was cancelled and we went back light engine, to the depot, two days later repeat and all went well with the station master in control, dead start up Langley bank 1in60 gradient but Frank was up to the task no slipping plenty of regulator and we top the bank easily.

Our loco turntable was not big enough to turn a Pacific, west country class merchant navy etc, so if a Pacific work to Woking from Bournemouth or Salisbury it was facing the wrong way so had to be turned, the crews would leave their engine at the coal stage, if it needed work on it, it would be left on no 2 road this was the only road where you could go straight over the turntable and into the running shed.

The foreman would inform my driver and we would make our way up to the coal stage and get the engine ready and pull up to the ground signal. I would then have to inform the signalman where we were going by a telegraph machine it was a 12inch disc with destinations inscribed on it. you would select and move the pointer to Chertsey, and the signalman would set the road and off you go, at Chertsey you would reverse round to Weybridge and then back to Guildford. I enjoyed this run out because it gave you a chance to work the firehole door, it was steam operated by pressing a pedal in the floor, when turned on you pressed the pedal and the door opened, coal on the shovel into the firebox, getting the timing right was another matter, if you got it wrong the shovel would hit the door closing and spill over the footplate with strong words from your driver.

Dear Editor

May I, a reader from distant Liftondown, be allowed to comment in your magazine?

In September issue you highlighted the government's voucher scheme for ultrafast broadband involving voucher application, commitment to contract for the service and a wait of {at least?} 18 months.

I was fed up with the partial fibre speeds {copper from the box to home} and speeds of half the 'guaranteed' level. I reported to my supplier who told me there was a line fault. It was not remedied within 30 days and I exercised my right to cancel the contract penalty free.

I contacted Airband and Wildanet. Airband responded quickly and within 3 weeks I was up and running at guaranteed speeds of 40 download and 10 upload. I have had it for just over a week but the speeds have always exceeded the guarantees stated. Today is 47 down and 11 up.

I am a domestic user and these speeds are plenty for me. I no longer have 'buffering' on Netflix, for example.

This costs me £30 from month 5 – first four free – for a two year contract with no in-contract price increases.

For those frustrated by low speeds this MIGHT be a better answer and a good deal sooner. It will depend if the service is available in Lewdown, which you can check on Airband's or Wildanet's web sites.

As we have good mobile phone reception, we were able to give up our landline so this is a consideration too if mobile reception is poor although I believe you can still operate your landline via the new internet connection.

I hope this is useful rather than confusing for Lewdown. It may be the answer for your circulation area beyond Lewdown not covered by the government's scheme.

Ed: We are in a chalk & cheese situation. Gigabit fibre will provide speeds starting at 1,000 megabits per second (more than 25 times faster than the Airband offering and much faster still than most broadband services) and over time this will improve as fibre technology improves. If we fail to get Gigabit now then I believe our community will remain stuck in the dark ages as the government is unlikely to make another rural grant available, especially as areas who are interested in Gigabit will have applied so there is little point in offering another scheme to communities that have express little interest.

The members of our family that have come and shared the summer with us are all indispensable and much loved. It matters not if some are actually related or not, they


are all essential members of our family and we would not be without any of them: even with some of their/our peculiarities!



When Englishman Chris Broad landed in a rural village in northern Japan he wondered


if he'd made a huge mistake. With no knowledge of the language and zero teaching experience, was he about to be the most quickly fired English teacher in Japan's history?

Tomato puree

Stuffed Marrow Recipe:

Another family favourite, this one comes with a bit of a health warning!

Ingredients: Beef mince Nice marrow Onion

> Carrots Celery

Peas Gravy granules Seasoning

Method:

Use the ingredients to make a bolognaise, adjust the ingredients to suit the size of the marrow. Cook up the bolognaise and set aside to cool.

Preheat oven to 200 C fan. Cut the marrow in half, length wise, this is the dangerous bit, depending on the size. Remove seeds etc. sprinkle plenty of salt over both halves. Leave for an hour, wash off the salt and dry off with kitchen tissue.



Stuff both halves of the marrow with the bolognaise. flip them together (not easy if you are dealing with a big marrow) to make it look like a whole marrow. Cover with foil and cook in the oven for 30-45 minutes, yes you guessed it, depending on size may need longer, prick the flesh of the marrow, if soft remove from oven, slice into portions and serve with boiled potatoes, salad and optionally grated cheese.


You can make your poppies in four colours:

Red - memorial to world war one and following conflicts.


Purple - to remembers animal victims of war.

Poppy template for any medium:




Poppy cross stich pattern:







Gardening Jobs For October

Autumn is upon us, even if we barely had a summer. Between the autumn showers there is still plenty to do in the garden and whilst this month's instalment is more of a 'show review', I've still managed to squeeze in a few quick tips...

Show review

The local village show is always a great spectacle for those who are interested in that kind of thing, and this year was no exception - there was a great selection of vegetables, fruit, flowers and crafts of all different shapes, colours and sizes on display.



A big shout out to Frankie, whose set of 6 shallots not only pipped my entry to 1st prize but also received a rosette for best vegetable exhibit in the show - I am only a tad jealous...

My favourite entries included a collection of pure white sweet peas, four brilliant yellow tomatoes and some rather tasty looking homemade fudge. On display were also dazzling dahlias, huge hydrangeas and a reasonably sized marrow (courtesy of yours truly).

Whilst I wasn't counting, I am reliably informed my marrow entry was an impressive 17 inches long. I must admit I was a little disappointed that I could still hold the marrow up in one hand - next year's challenge is to grow a marrow that requires at least two hands to lift!



Quick fire tips for October

- This month is the best time to plant garlic, before it gets too wet and cold. This year I'll be growing mine under cover in the polytunnel to reduce the risk of rust next spring. I'll also be trying to grow elephant garlic for the first time
- If you want to take the 'No Dig' approach to gardening, then mulch your beds with a good layer of compost after harvesting the last of your summer crops. This will feed next years crops and reduce weeds
- You should just have time to make final sowings of winter cover crops like white mustard and winter rye, although broad or field beans can be sown into November and often overwinter better as smaller plants



From the Mountains of Japan

No.7 - Myoko's Retro Sunshine Paradise

Japan has its fair share of theme parks, from the ultra-modern two-pronged attack of Tokyo Disneyland and Tokyo DisneySea, to the mountainous, terrifying rollercoasters of Fuji-Q Highland, but for something a little more throwback, an interesting option is Nigatta Prefecture's aging bastion of theme park greatness, Myoko Sunshine Land.

Thirty minutes south of the Japan Sea, Myoko Sunshine Land sits pretty much in the middle of nowhere, at the foot of a mountain resort area that comes alive during the winter ski season, but for the rest of the year is mostly just seen from the window of a passing car or train.

Next to a golf course and a small hotel, the theme park itself is a collection of low-cost amusement rides which looks about fifty years old. Most of the rides are basic, like a big wheel, a couple of Go Kart tracks, a Viking ship, a merry-go-round, and a hall of mirrors in such bad condition that you can actually create your own route through the flimsy plywood walls. While it's fun for kids, one ride, the safari train, on which you can fire a pretend gun at plastic big game animals as well as some cutout stereotypical locals, teaches rather out of date morals and could do with being replaced with something a little less controversial.

On the plus side, its cheap, there is always plenty of room in the car park, and you're more likely to be calling for a staff member to start one of the rides than to be queuing for long. It's important to check the weather though, as the last time I visited with my daughter it was pouring with rain, and with nowhere really that's indoors - the restaurant is a hole-in-the-wall takeaway place with some chilly outdoor seating - to find a little warmth we had no choice but to huddle inside the big wheel's cramped cabin, peering out through grimy windows at the mist-shrouded park below.

While you won't get the glitz of Tokyo's Disneyland Resorts nor the thrills of Osaka's Universal Studios, Myoko Sunshine Land is a useful place to stop for an hour or two to break up a long journey through central Japan. And if you time it right, you might just find the sun to be shining.

- 1. Apologies for absence Cllrs Mincher & Southcott.
- 2. Members of the public open forum no members present
- 3. New defibrillator location(s) consideration for new location(s) item held over for next meeting
- Defibrillator replacement update including grant availability. Replacement parts for the existing defibrillator at the Blue Lion have now been supplied and fitted. An additional defibrillator will be discussed at the next meeting.
- 5. Dispensations & declarations of interest None
- 6. Minutes of previous meeting 778 being a true reflection of that meeting was approved and signed by the chair. Proposed Cllr Yeo, seconded Cllr Alexander, all in favour.
- 7. Reports from Cllr Mott (WDBC) this was emailed to all councillors prior to the meeting.
- 8. Finance 8.1 Payment was authorised for outstanding invoice to Dean Elliot Grass cutting £120.00, 8.2 Bank signatory update All changes have now been confirmed. 8.3 Insurance review of parish council assets The R.F.O. reported that he had now received written confirmation that council assets housed in councillors property are also covered under the existing policy.
- 9. Draft Grant policy A grant policy and application form was considered and thought appropriate, clerk to provide the policy and application form for approval at the next meeting.

Reports from councillors Cllr Wilkinson reported that nettles and brambles were now overhanging the pavement from the recreation ground to the school and suggested that this should be attended to prior to the beginning of the new school term. 



Over to our speakers: Sarah and Simon Milestone from Market Garden, Newton Abbott. Sarah and Simon bought an empty 2-acre field in 2021 and started selling produce in 2022. They now go to market once a week



and provide veg boxes to their local area within a 17m radius. Sarah is crazy about her chickens, started off with 4 and now has 30 plus 2 baby cockerels. We are her 3rd WI that they are visiting with more in the pipeline. Sarah went off to cook some of their gorgeous looking produce and Simon took over. He talked in detail about his past, present and futures plans, his inspirations, spreadsheets, planting, no-dig method, how to be profitable and have produce all year round. This was all informative. Then





we had questions from the floor, including the buzzword this year: slugs! Being an organic gardener, his advice is to go out in the dark, with a torch and pick them off. In 2022 we had a draught, no slugs then, 2023 a wet summer, followed by a wet autumn, hey presto in 2024 the slugs come out in full force. Because of the drought, they invested in a borehole.

They also dug a couple of ponds for extra water and pest control. Suddenly, the kitchen emitted some delicious smells of cooked food and we all tasted their mixed greens, Aztec broccoli, courgettes & various types of tomatoes. Everyone found the food really tasty.
