

Reflections of a Steam Fireman

As we moved closer to the end of steam on the 9th July 1967 all our older engines were gradually withdrawn and towed away for scrap with rods removed and put in the tender, S15 4-6-0 tender engines had gone for scrap and Q 0-6-0 Q1 0-6-0 U 2-6-0 and N 2-6-0 had started to be withdrawn.

The loco was allocated extra standard class loco 4-6-0 and 2-6-0 tender engines plus Standard tanks 2-6-4 and 2-6-2 also diesel as they became available.

The smoke box was supposed to be self cleaning but to undo the door, no spanner needed unlike the older engine with 8 nuts to undo, just unscrew the handle releasing the other handle, move a quarter turn, door opens, check and clean, they were fitted with rocker fire grates, so no shovelling clinker.

But I missed the skill that was needed to do the older engines. This would involve shovelling the good fire to the right and cleaning the clinker with a long shovel and withdraw it into the cab and out the side onto the ash pit. The shovel would get hot, but one hand was in a ring on the end of the shovel and the other hand would let the rod of the shovel run across it protected by your cloth that was issued. If you did it right you did not burn yourself. You then used the pricker to clean out the back corner. If heavy clinker, the dart would be used to scrape it off the fire bars, then put the good fire on the right to the left and clean the right side of clinker, when cleaned, pull up under the door and shovel coal onto the fire, open dampers fully into the pit make sure wind direction is in the right direction and with the ash pan rake, clean out ash pan, reset dampers.

I did not realise that this skill was so needed when I was seventeen and was 7am cover when the foreman said the 0930 Bournemouth had failed at Woking and we had to take a standard class 5mt 4-6-0 to Woking pronto, it involved taking an engine that was just about to leave the loco much to the crews dismay making the fire up going tender first to Woking, I inform the signalman at Woking home signal and he set us back onto train in the station by this time the engine was lifting her safety valves, the fireman and driver of the failed engine relieved us and with the right away set off.

My driver said the failed engine is down the east end carriage sidings and it has dropped a fusible plug in the boiler designed to protect the boiler (water to low) I did not realise that when we got to the engine an un-rebuilt west country class that nothing works no steam and my driver said the fire has to be removed.

And the firebox was full, so I set about removing the fire but without the blower the flames were rolling back towards me, I put buckets of water on the fire and it was like being in a steam room so I had to kneel on the floor and shovel burning coal out of the cab there was no pit and I had to keep getting down and moving it away from the engine because of the engine valve gear it is in an oil bath and are prone to catching alight, my driver carried buckets of water to put on the hot coals, I was exhausted but had managed to clean out the firebox and we were towed to the loco for repair.

Cheesy Onion and Potato Soup: A yummy recipe - 6 servings

Ingredients:

3 medium cooking onions, chopped 2 tbsp. butter 4 medium potatoes, peeled, cubed 500 ml chicken stock (use vegetable for vegetarian recipe) Salt and pepper to taste 750 ml milk 250 g grated cheese (Cheddar or Leicester)

Method:

In a large saucepan cook onions in butter until soft but not brown. Add potatoes, stock, salt and pepper. Cover and bring to boil then simmer until the potatoes are tender – approximately 15 minutes. Remove from heat and liquidise in batches. Return to the saucepan. Add milk and cheese and reheat slowly until the

cheese melts. Do not boil.

I often make this in advance up to the point of adding milk and cheese and do that when I am ready to heat and serve.



From the Mountains of Japan

No.10 - Hotaka Wasabi Farm

If you go to any sushi restaurant in Japan, as well as fish and rice you'll find in abundance a bright green paste that if consumed in too great an amount will leave your nose tingling and eyes watering. This is "wasabi", or Japanese horse radish.

Wasabi is a water-grown root that thrives in clear and cool mountain water out of the Japanese Alps. The biggest wasabi farm in Japan is in Hotaka, about half an hour north of Matsumoto and an hour or so from where I live.

Hotaka Wasabi Farm is an interesting place to spend an afternoon. The wasabi "fields" are several large areas of shallow water fed by the nearby river and filled with green plants. In summer they are covered by black nets to block the strong sun, in winter by white ones, perhaps to hold off the heavy snow. The fields are separated by hilly areas upon which are viewing platforms, little shrines, and even a "ya-ho" horn for shouting across one of the fields to your friend on the other side.

There are also a pair of rather picturesque waterwheels near the entrance, which one assumes had to have had some old-world function, but were actually constructed in 1990 as part of a movie set for Dreams by Akira Kurasawa (he of Seven Samurai fame), and kept, basically because they make for a good photo.

Other wonderful attractions include a pond containing several large fish that look like trout but are actually the locally famous "Shinshu Salmon", a cross between brown and rainbow trout, developed by landlocked Nagano's government about thirty years ago and now a popular export. So, I guess that means that they are technically trout...!

And on our most recent visit last week, we made sure to enjoy



several of the wasabi-themed foods on sale, including wasabi croquette burgers and wasabi ice-cream. You can also get other items such as wasabi pickles and wasabi wine. Thankfully there was no wasabi in the apple pie that I ate!



My Herbal Treasures in March - Cleavers

Also known as Goosegrass or Sticky Willy, Cleavers is one of the first of our spring allies to appear, though it was perhaps a little later this year than I remember as I only managed my first harvest last weekend. It's found mainly in woods and hedgerows and, along with its good friend stinging nettle, is one of the first wild herbs many people learn about.

Cleavers is a herb of the moon and is governed by the element of water and this is key to my understanding of



how it works in the body. As a medicinal herb it is most commonly used to treat the lymphatic system, a network of vessels which runs alongside the blood circulation carrying waste materials in lymph fluid ready for processing in the lymph nodes and organs such as the tonsils, thymus and spleen. The lymph has no pump of its own so is reliant on the movement of blood and muscles to aid its journey, so exercise is vital for a healthy lymphatic system. It's functions are primarily to aid cleansing of the tissues and assist the immune system by transporting white blood cells and antibodies.

To me, the lymph relates very closely to the water element in us and, as we know, the moon affects fluids in all of nature by governing flows and tides. The nature of water is to be fluid, we can easily see how polluted stagnant water becomes, and the lymph must also be flowing in order to perform its functions within the body. In the winter we can become more stagnant and accumulations tend to build up, stressing the lymphatic system and resulting in lowered immunity, swollen glands and sluggishness.

Cleavers is all about getting things moving and flowing again. I see it as an initiator and indeed it is meant to be auspicious to drink it before a journey. It doesn't force change, just gently encourages the body to wake and clear itself, helping to remove excess fluids through its diuretic action. This quality means it is also a good urinary tonic, especially in inflammatory conditions of the urinary tract as it is also anti-inflammatory. Its useful for clearing the skin, partly due to its general alterative properties, and it has been used to treat cancers, both internally and externally as a poultice.

The water element also governs the emotions and Cleavers can help us to gently let go of the past and be ready to embrace the new growth and change that Spring awakens.

Cleavers is covered in tiny little hooked bristles which you can see in the close up below which I took last year, later in the season when the plant was more mature.

I see Cleavers as a plant of youth, not only because of it's appearance early in the spring but due to it ability to entertain the child in us all when, on long walks, we

can engage in the game I never grow tired of, how many cleavers can you stick on someone's back before they notice 🐵

I think the real reason Cleavers grab on to us as we go by is because, in a damp climate like the UK, we could all do with a bit of lymphatic support and she is generously reminding us of the great service she can offer.

The plant itself is strong yet supple. It is flexible enough to be twisted round itself and apparently, country folk used to use it in this way to make a sieve for straining milk. It uses its little hooks to grow up other plants to get to the light, yet its strong enough to support them too when needed.

Cleavers Green Juice

Juice is my favourite way to take them and also the most potent as we are ingesting the life blood of the plant which is an incredible gift. It does require the use of a juicer but if you don't have one you could whizz it in the blender with some water and then strain, though I haven't tried it this way. I juice a big handful of cleavers with some apple, fennel, lemon, ginger and celery. This makes a delicious cleansing and revitalising drink for bright Spring mornings.

Cleavers Vinegar

Make your Cleavers into a delicious green vinegar by lightly packing a jar with them then covering in unpasteurised apple cider vinegar. Cap with a plastic not



metal lid (vinegar corrodes metal) and allow to infuse for three weeks before straining and rebottling. This makes a lovely spring salad dressing with a drizzle of olive oil.

Cleavers Salad

At this time of year you can finely chop the young cleavers and add to salads, though later in the Spring they become too tough and stringy. Enjoy them now while they're tender!

Cleavers Cold Infusion

Many people prepare their cleavers as a cold infusion

by popping a handful in a glass, covering in cold water and leaving overnight to infuse. Strain and drink in the morning for a refreshing start to the day.

Cleavers Succus

This one comes from Matthew and Julie Bruton-Seal's wonderful book *Hedgerow Medicine* which I would recommend to anyone interested in wildcrafting herbs. Juice fresh cleavers, measure it and add an equal amount of runny honey. Bottle and label. It will last much longer this way and would be a lovely soothing and effective remedy for tonsilitis.



Gardening Jobs For April

Finally, April is here and the sun is shining (I hope). At this time of year everything seems to speed up, and as the days get longer so does the to do list!

Planting out

Come the first week or so of April, most of the crops you sowed back in March will be ready to plant out into the garden. I aim to plant my onions, peas, lettuce and beetroot on the first weekend in April. I will often cover fresh plantings with a layer of fleece for a week or two, it not only helps keep the worst of any frost off but also helps stop the pesky birds.

A couple of years ago I was given a long-handled dibber for Christmas, and I use it for 'dibbing' the planting holes for anything I've started off in module trays - an old broom handle should do the trick.

Growing tomatoes

The first episode of Gardeners World aired on Friday 14th March, and Monty Don started sowing his tomato seeds – I ignored his advice, and will be starting mine in the middle of April instead, which I find works much better because they are so quick growing.

I multi sow my seeds into small module trays (3cm/cell), as I find that seed trays can get water logged and are a waste of compost. Once the seedlings emerge about 10 days or so later, I prick the little plants out into individual cells so that they can grow on under the protection of my growhouse.

As a general rule of thumb, I pot the tomatoes on one more time (after another 10 days or so) into larger modules or 9cm pots. This way they can grow on into really strong healthy plants, ready to be planted out in to the polytunnel by mid-May once the nights warm up.

Quick fire tips

- As I said last month, there is still no rush to sow seeds of those more tender crops. Although, if you have a greenhouse or a polytunnel you could certainly try an earlier crop than those that will be planted outdoors.
- Beware of late frosts, which can happen even into May. Lots of things that you would plant in April, including onions, peas & salad are unlikely to be killed by a frost but a cold snap can certainly set them back a bit!
- Stay on top of weeds, as vegetables and fruit start to take off, so do the weeds. I still need to master my use of a hoe, as I'd rather not revert to crawling around the plot like I did last year.

From the Parish Priest

Dear Friends,

I have mentioned on more than one occasion the statues of the 20th Century Christian Martyrs on the West Front of Westminster Abbey. A collection of faithful and brave Christians from across the denominational divides, who lost their lives because of their commitment to Christ and his teachings.

One of them is, of course, an image of Dr. Martin Luther-King Jr. who lived through and campaigned against the appalling injustice of a racially segregated society in the USA

in the fifties and sixties. His community, and his family, lived through very dark days indeed.

He is quoted as saying that "Only when it is dark enough, can you see the stars". This is something that I am reminded of when I am out and about after dark in this beautiful part of God's Kingdom.

Sadly, the past few weeks have ushered at least the potential for very dark days, and I have had a number of conversations with people who are concerned and frightened regarding the changes there have been in the world order in the past weeks.

Dr King is right though, sometimes the glory of what is good can only be recognised when compared with the contrast of what is wanting. As Christians we are not only looking up at the brightness of the stars, but at the brightness of the resurrection of Jesus. We can be too easily tempted to see the resurrection life as something that only happens the other side of death, rather than something we are called to live here and now.

Sometimes, as Dr King, and other Martyrs have demonstrated, proclaiming the resurrection life can be a dangerous thing to do, but we follow a saviour who put himself at risk for others.

As we work towards the annual commemoration of the suffering, death and resurrection of Jesus, let us hear Christ's call to proclaim the good news of his love, peace, justice, kindness and compassion and loudly and joyfully proclaim it.
